Notice of Study Commencement

We Want To Hear From You

We are requesting public input and comments about the Transportation Master Plan Update and the Master Servicing Plan (for water, sanitary and stormwater services). These plans are separate but are being completed at the same time so that work in the road boundaries can be planned to minimize disruptions for the public. The City's Official Plan is being reviewed now and information from that process will be used to make decisions about changes and upgrades to the streets and the services under them.

The City will use comments received from the public in the development of the various transportation and water and wastewater servicing approaches. A minimum of three (3) meetings (Public Information Centres) will be held to provide information and receive feedback from the public. The first meeting will be held June 26, 2013. At this meeting we will introduce the master planning studies and get input from the public on issues and ideas about water, sanitary and stormwater services, and transportation infrastructure for all types of transportation.

The Process

Both studies follow the master planning process of the Municipal Engineers Association. The Master Plans will follow Approach #2 which will fulfill the requirements for Schedule A, A+, and B projects and become the basis for future investigations for specific Schedule C projects. The studies are being conducted according to the requirements of the Municipal Class Environmental Assessment, which is a planning process approved under Ontario's Environmental Assessment Act.










Previous Transportation Master Plan (2007) Roadway Improvements and Implemented Projects







of the Grand River







City of Brantford Trails and Paths
















Previous Transportation Master Plan (2007) Cycling and Trail Network Plan









City Growth



A number of discussions were also held by the study team with PIC attendees. Highlights of these conversations are listed below:

- Traffic congestion on Brant Avenue and use of Grand Avenue as an alternative route.
- Opportunity to widen Clarence at the cemetery where city right-of-way may be available.
- Update neighbourhood traffic calming by using more stop signs (Don Drackley responded that stop signs are not for traffic calming so the study team would not support this).
- Multi-use trails on each side of Shellard Lane vs current plan for trail on one side and sidewalk on the other. Don Drackley said sufficient right-of-way is available for this.
- There are environmental benefits of roundabouts (i.e. better traffic flow = reduced air quality emissions).
- In the GO Transit Business Plan, stress that the province has designated Brantford (actually downtown Brantford) as a growth centre and so the province should provide associated transportation services.
- Concerns about two new subdivisions planned along Hardy Road and resulting traffic impacts. Cost of improving Hardy Road and who pays (Don Drackley explained DC charges).

The first Public Information Centre for this project took place on June 26, 2013, providing information and opportunities for discussion on the transportation challenges, priorities and choices facing the City of Brantford. Since then, the Study Team has reviewed existing and forecasted transportation needs in the City. Technical studies have also been prepared in support of the Transportation Master Plan dealing, for example, with traffic growth and management, trail and bikeway planning, introduction of GO Transit service and potential changes to traffic management and parking policies in the City.

The second public consultation event took place on October 24, 2013. It was held as a workshop to give the public an opportunity to view and comment on:

- Future travel demand forecasts (e.g., future travel patterns and key intersection operations);
- Strategic alternatives to address future transportation needs for all modes of travel;
- Role of Transit;
- Potential cycling route and off-road trail system plans; and
- The need for future roadway infrastructure.

There was a presentation and then the attendees gathered into three groups for the workshop. The groups were active transportation, transit and road network. Below is a summary of those topics discussed during the workshop.

ACTIVE TRANSPORTATION





Figure 2. Proposed Bikeways and Trails Network

The active transportation group gathered to discuss cycling and walking in Brantford. Trails were discussed along with bike lanes. Figures 1 and 2 were used to facilitate discussion (note all figures can be found in the presentation posted on the project website at http://www.brantford.ca/TransportationMasterPlan).

- 1. What is your vision for walking and cycling in Brantford?
- Walking and cycling should be accessible for all Brantford residents as an opportunity to be active and healthy.

Figure 1. Walking and Cycling in Brantford Today

- Access to the trails should be equitable and connected to all neighbourhoods, thus neighbourhood trails are just as important to the network as the trails along the Grand River.
- 2. What do you think about the existing walking and cycling facilities in the City?
- Sidewalk maintenance is just as an important a concern as building new sidewalks where they are missing.
- The main trails should be available to all types of user or all abilities, accessibility in design is important.
- 3. Comments on the DRAFT changes to the Bikeways and Trail Network.
- The City should take advantage of the CN rail corridors that are being abandoned (i.e. add east-west route adjacent Greenwich towards Waterfront Park).
- Even though park trails look connected on the map, special treatments or paving may be needed to ensure access. These types of connections should be added to the network.
- The addition of streetscaping and amenities is a good idea, especially for pedestrians
- The proposed network should have a variety of route options to accommodate people
 with different levels of skills and comfort cycling (i.e. not everyone will be comfortable
 cycling on main through streets).
- North Park is proposed for a road diet; this type of project has been proposed in the past the local community (i.e. school) was opposed due to concerns over access constraints.
 Some of the proposed facilities may need education or positive examples (that are similar to Brantford) to demonstrate their benefits.
- Some guidance may be needed for trail development where a high portion of pedestrians and cyclists may warrant separate space on the trail for different user types.
- 4. What else can the City do to encourage more walking and cycling?
- E-bikes are becoming an issue on the off-road trails. They may be an important part of cycling in the city elsewhere, but should not be allowed on trails dues to safety concerns (i.e. larger vehicles, difficult to detect, higher speeds than regular bikes).
- The City could consider maintaining trails during the winter to allow for year-round access. Even trails in the boulevard are not maintained even if sidewalks on the same street are cleared of snow, perhaps a winter signed route network is appropriate.
- In new development areas, there are missing links of sidewalks as they await development. "Pre-investment" in sidewalks links in areas that are intended for development should be considered.

PUBLIC TRANSIT

The public transit group gathered to discuss the role of transit in the City of Brantford. Figure 3 is the display board used to facilitate discussion.

1. Priority for Transit:

- Transit is important to the community.
- There should be connections to the GO system. Need "inter-county" or inter-municipal links to make city accessible. This is important to attract people to Brantford.
- Priority links are from Brantford to Paris and Brantford to Cambridge.

However there is a need to improve internal service within the city first.

2. Future Role for Transit:

- The future role of transit includes increasing use of transit, benefits for the environment, and an alternative to using a car. Other benefits to the community include better health and road costs.
- Connections to GO Transit for Brantford to Hamilton and Brantford to Burlington.
- Look at future potential, not the current traffic.
- Concerns about the future of VIA Rail. There is currently limited Greyhound service.

3. Internal (Within City) Transit Needs:

- There is a need for express routes that connect key points to reduce travel times. For
 example travelling downtown to Lynden Park Mall. One person commented that it takes
 45 minutes but others pointed out there's a direct route which takes 12 minutes.
- There is a need for HOV lanes for transit. It should be a transit priority to speed up transit buses.
- Change a transit policy that allows people to do stopovers ("Open Window" transfer policy).
- Policies to promote transit:
 - Monthly Passes to everyone entice people, have other incentives.
 - Marketing program advertise/promote transit use.
 - o Park and ride.
 - Parking fees, for example charge for parking at malls
 - Locate development near transit routes, not on outskirts of the city.

4. Investment Priority for Transit

- Improve internal service first before going outside
- Have Developers for industrial or residential areas pay for new transit
- Re-brand the Bus, give it a new image. Discussion concluded need a "better system" before re-branding.
- Use new technology:
 - o Social media, use of smart phones (transit is currently doing this).
 - Passes have more places to buy them around the city. This is a challenge due to use of smart cards and need for kiosks at sales outlets. Can be expensive.
 - Have Wi-Fi on buses (however it may not be practical due to short time people on bus – also, may be other sources/suppliers for wi-fi)

2. Southwest Brantford and River Crossings

- Agreement that river crossings and access to downtown is a problem, that will worsen with growth in the southwest
- No direct routing to Highway 403, people use a variety of routes mostly through the downtown
- Split opinion on VMP extension and connection to Wayne Gretzky
 - Major impacts on Mohawk Park and First Nations, existing neighborhood, too expensive, not worth it
 - City already owns the houses at foot of Wayne Gretzky, a good alignment could minimize impacts and provide major benefits

Figure 4. Critical Sections 2011




Figure 5. Critical Sections 2031





Figure 6. Previous Transportation Master Plan (2007) Roadway Improvements and Implemented Projects

- Traffic uses Johnson Road to shortcut from Colborne St to Garden Ave, though left turn from Johnson Rd to Garden Ave NB can be difficult
- Agreement on Charing Cross extension

6. Other Improvements

Agree with planning to widen Wayne Gretzky to six lanes when needed

The City of Brantford has retained IBI Group to undertake the development of a city-wide Transportation Master Plan Update which will be instrumental in improving the way people and goods move through and around the City. Brantford is changing and growing, and the current transportation system needs to adapt to embrace a more sustainable travel future for everyone. The Transportation Master Plan Update is being carried out in conjunction with the City's Master Servicing Plan and Official Plan Update.

- The city invests its fair share in public transit. Transit fare in the GHTA is around \$3.25 and in Brantford it is \$3.00.

3. Continue to invest in active transportation to increase cycling and walking in Brantford?

- Better for businesses, personal health and street safety.
- More paved bike trails separate from the road; shared lanes are hazardous to cyclists.
- "Liveable cities" requires such thinking and planning.



Thank you for circulating Infrastructure Ontario (formerly the Ontario Realty Corporation) on your Notice. Infrastructure Ontario (IO) is the strategic manager of the provincial government's real estate property with a mandate of maintaining and optimizing value of the portfolio, while ensuring real estate decisions reflect public policy objectives of the government.

As you may be aware, IO is responsible for managing real estate property that is owned by Her Majesty the Queen in Right of Ontario as represented by the Minister of Infrastructure (MOI). There is a potential that IO manages lands that fall within your study area. As a result, your proposal may impact IO managed properties and/or the activities of tenants present on IOmanaged lands. In order to determine if IO property is within your study area, IO requires that the proponent of the project conduct a title search by reviewing parcel register(s) for adjoining lands, to determine the extent of ownership by MOI or it's predecessors (listed below) ownership. Please contact IO if any ownership of provincial government lands are known to occur within your study area and are proposed to be impacted. IO is obligated to complete due diligence for any realty activity on IO managed lands and this should be incorporated into all project timelines. IO managed lands can include within the title but is not limited to variations of the following: Her Majesty the Queen/King, OLC, ORC, Public Works, Hydro One, PIR, MGS, MBS, MOI, MTO, MNR and MEI*. Please ensure that a copy of your notice is also sent to the ministry/agency on title. As an example, if the study area includes a Provincial Park, then MNR is to also to be circulated notices related to your project.

Potential Negative Impacts to IO Tenants and Lands

General Impacts

Negative environmental impacts associated with the project design and construction, such as the potential for dewatering, dust, noise and vibration impacts, and impacts to natural heritage features/habitat and functions, should be avoided and/or appropriately mitigated in accordance with applicable regulations best practices and Ministry of Natural Resources (MNR) and Ministry of the Environment (MOE) standards. Thank you for the Notice of Study Commencement dated May 17, 2013, regarding the Master Plan undertaking for the above noted project. Projects resulting from this type of study often require approval under the Environmental Assessment Act (EAA).

It is important for the master planning process to ensure that the public is kept well-informed as to the progress that is being made, and that particular effort be made to ensure that information is readily available in as user-friendly language as possible, given the technical nature of the project. It is Ministry practice to require detailed documentation regarding the public consultation process that has been undertaken and the efforts made to address the public or agencies' concerns, especially where Part II Orders may be received.

With respect to agency consultation, please keep in mind the range of other approvals and/or permits that may be required in order to implement the specific projects that are identified through the master planning exercise. It is crucial that these agencies are circulated so that their input is obtained and their issues are addressed.

Consultation with First Nation and Métis Communities

The Crown has a duty to consult First Nation and Métis communities if there is a potential impact to Aboriginal or treaty rights. As the proponent of this project, you have a responsibility to conduct adequate consultation with First Nation and Métis communities as part of the environmental assessment process. The Crown is therefore, delegating the procedural aspects of consultation to you as outlined in the attached document.

You must contact the Director, Environmental Approvals Branch if a project may adversely affect an Aboriginal or treaty right, or if a Part II Order request is anticipated; the Ministry will then determine whether the Crown has a duty to consult. Information and resources to assist you in fulfilling this requirement are provided as an attachment.

In summary, it is our expectation that the master planning exercise will:

- Address the key principles of successful environmental;
- Address at least the first two phases of the MEA;
- Allow for an integrated process with other planning initiatives;
- Provide a strategic level assessment of various options to better address overall system needs and potential impacts and mitigation;
- Take a system-wide approach to planning which relates infrastructure either geographically or by a particular function;

- Recommend an infrastructure master plan which can be implemented through the implementation of separate projects; and
- Include a description of the specific projects including any other approvals that will be required.

ABORIGINAL CONSULTATION INFORMATION

Interest-based consultation with First Nation and Métis Communities

Proponents subject to the *Environmental Assessment Act* are required to consult with interested First Nation and Métis communities in addition to consultation with interested persons. Special effort may be required to ensure that First Nation and Métis communities are made aware of the project and are afforded an opportunity to provide comments.

Proponents are required to contact the Ministry of Aboriginal Affairs (MAA) and Aboriginal Affairs and Northern Development Canada (AANDC) to help identify which First Nation and Métis communities may be impacted by your project. It is important to ensure that MAA and AANDC are advised of any communities identified for consultation during previous stages of the project when making this request. You are advised to provide notification directly to all of the First Nation and Métis communities who may be interested in the project.

Rights-based consultation with First Nation and Métis Communities

Proponents should also be aware that certain projects may affect the ability of a First Nation or Métis community to exercise their confirmed or asserted Aboriginal or treaty rights. In such cases, Ontario may have a duty to consult to ensure the protection of the potentially affected right. Activities which may restrict access to unoccupied Crown lands, or could result in a potential to impact to land or water resources, generally have the potential to impact Aboriginal or treaty rights. For assistance in determining whether your project could affect these rights, refer to the attached "Preliminary Assessment Checklist: First Nation and Métis Community Interest."

If there is an impact to Aboriginal or treaty rights, accommodation may be required to avoid or minimize the adverse impacts. Accommodation is an outcome of consultation and includes any mechanism used to avoid or minimize adverse impacts to Aboriginal or treaty rights and traditional uses. Solutions could include adjustments in the timing or geographic location of the proposed activity; accommodation does not necessarily require the provision of financial compensation.

Delegation of Procedural Aspects of Consultation

Proponents, by virtue of their knowledge and participation in project activities, have an important and direct role in the consultation process to ensure both success and certainty. Where the Crown's duty to consult is triggered, **Ontario is delegating these procedural aspects of this rights-based consultation to you as the proponent of the project.**

Ontario will have an oversight role as the consultation process unfolds but will be relying on the steps undertaken and information you obtain to ensure adequate consultation has taken place. To ensure that First Nation and Métis communities have the ability to assess a project for its potential to impact on an Aboriginal or treaty right, there are certain procedural aspects of consultation that Ontario requires proponents to undertake.

The responsibilities of the proponent for procedural aspects of consultation include:

- Providing notice to the elected leadership of the First Nation and/or Métis communities (e.g., First Nation Chief) as early as possible regarding the project;
- Providing First Nation and/or Métis communities with information about the proposed project including anticipated impacts, information on timelines and your environmental assessment process;
- Following up with First Nation and/or Métis communities to ensure they received project
 information and that they are aware of the opportunity to express comments and concerns
 about the project; if you are unable to make the appropriate contacts (e.g. are unable to
 contact the Chief) please contact the Ministry of the Environment for further direction.
- Providing First Nation and/or Métis communities with opportunities to meet with appropriate representatives to discuss the project;
- Gathering information about how the project may adversely impact the Aboriginal and/or Treaty rights (for example, hunting, fishing) or sites of cultural significance (for example, burial grounds, archaeological sites);
- Considering the comments and concerns provided by First Nation and/or Métis communities and providing responses;
- Where appropriate, discussing potential mitigation strategies with First Nation and/or Métis communities;
- Bearing the reasonable costs associated with these procedural aspects of consultation.
- Maintaining a Consultation Record and upon request, providing copies of the Consultation Record to Ontario. The Consultation Record should:
 - summarize the nature of any comments and questions received from First Nation and/or Métis communities
 - o describe the response to comments and how concerns were considered
 - o include a communications log indicating the dates and times of all communications; and
 - document activities in relation to consultation.

Successful consultation depends, in part, on early engagement by proponents with First Nation and Métis communities. Information shared with communities must be clear, accurate and complete, and in plain language where possible. The consultation process must maintain sufficient flexibility to respond to new information, and we trust you will make all reasonable efforts to build positive relationships with all First Nation and Métis communities contacted.

Thank you for the information regarding the above referenced project. We have reviewed the information, and note the following:

Transport Canada is responsible for the administration of the *Navigable Waters Protection Act* (NWPA), which prohibits the construction or placement of any "works" in navigable waters without first obtaining approval. If any of the related project undertakings cross or affect a potentially navigable waterway, the proponent should prepare and submit an application in accordance with the requirements as outlined in the attached Application Guide and Form. Any questions about the NWPA application process should be directed to the Navigable Waters Protection Program at (519) 383-1863 or <a href="https://www.nwpaper.com/nwpape

Please review the <u>Minor Works and Waters (Navigable Waters Protection Act) Order</u>, established to outline the specific standards and criteria under which Transport Canada considers a work as a minor and does not require an application under the NWPA. It is the responsibility of the applicant, prior to submitting an application to the Navigable Waters Protection Program for review, to assess whether their work meets the criteria, as described, and, therefore, falls within one of the excluded classes. An application will only be required if it is determined that the work cannot meet the criteria established for that particular "class" of excluded work.

Transport Canada is also responsible for inspecting and auditing federally regulated railway companies that are subject to the *Railway Safety Act*. Transport Canada also regulates some provincial shortlines from the Province of Ontario that are part of an Agreement between the Federal Government and the Province of Ontario. The *Railway Safety Act*, with related regulations and rules, provides the legislative and regulatory framework for safe railway operations in Canada. The rail safety program develops, implements and promotes safety policy, regulations, standards and research, and in the case of railway grade crossings, subsidizes safety improvements. A list of all the Rail Safety legislations (the *Act*, Regulations, Rules, Guidelines, Policies and Standards) that applies to the federally regulated railways, can be found here:

The *Act* also addresses the construction and alteration of railway works, the operation and maintenance of railway equipment and certain non-railway operations that may affect the safety of federally regulated railways. If a proposed railway work is of a prescribed kind, pursuant to the *Notice of Railway Works Regulations*, the proponent shall not undertake the work unless it has first given notice of the work in accordance with the regulation. Introduction

The **Navigable Waters Protection Act (Act)** protects the public right to boat freely on waterways in Canada. The Act and its regulations:

- Require the pre-approval of structures (known as works) to be placed in, on, over, under, through, or across any navigable waters; and
- · Provide a legal framework for dealing with obstacles and obstructions to navigation.

The Act was updated on March 12, 2009. You can find the Act and its regulations online at: http://laws.justice.gc.ca/en/N-22/

Transport Canada's (TC) Marine Safety, Navigable Waters Protection Program works to:

- · Protect the public right of navigation
- · Ensure safety for the shared use of Canada's waterways; and
- · Consider any impacts proposed works might have on the environment.

Navigable Waterways are any natural or man-made bodies of water (rivers, lakes, canals, etc.) that can be used by vessels to work, move freight, travel or enjoy pleasure activities – even if they were created for purposes other than navigation.

Get the Facts

What is a Minor Water?

Before starting construction, repairs or changes, owners should find out if their work is on a minor water or a navigable waterway. To determine if the waterway is minor you may refer to the *Minor Works and Waters (Navigable Waters Protection Act) Order* at http://www.tc.gc.ca/marinesafety/oep/nwpp/minorworks/menu.htm.

What is a work?

A work includes:

- · Any man-made structure, devise or thing, temporary or permanent, that may limit or prevent boating; and
- Any fill dumped into, or materials being dug from, the bed of navigable water that may limit or prevent boating.

What is a minor work?

Some works, called minor works, that <u>will not limit or prevent boating</u>, do not require TC approval. However, they must be placed, built and maintained according to the Minor Works and Waters (NWPA) Order. If they aren't, owners may be fined.

Minor works include:

- Winter Crossings
- · Submarine (underwater) Cables
- Water Intakes
- Aerial Cables
- · Pipeline Crossings
- · Erosion Protection Works
- Docks & Boathouses
- Dredging

Get Your Project Approved

All works, except those listed as minor works under the *Order*, must be approved by Transport Canada. TC approval is proof that your planned work will not limit or prevent boating.

Contact TC for approval well before your desired start date. This will give us time to review your project and respond.

Remember: You must request and get any local building or other permits you may need before you begin your work.

Approval process

Step One: Apply.

- 1. Prepare a letter or application form that includes the information set out in Table 1, below;
- Include a map and directions indicating the exact location of the worksite;
- Include onsite, upstream and downstream photos of the waterway.

Step Two: Wait for a response.

Transport Canada reviews proposed works based on information you provide, on-site assessment of the waterway and potential impacts to navigation. Once its review is complete, TC may issue an approval if the impacts to navigation can be lessened. The approval may include conditions you must meet.

The complete Transport Canada review can take some time because you may be asked to:

- · Provide more information:
- · Meet a Transport Canada official on site;
- · Deposit plans after confirmation to proceed,
- · Notify the public of the proposed work and allow one month for comments, and
- Support an environmental assessment of the work as per the under Canadian Environmental Assessment Act (CEAA).

Step Three: Receive a response.

If / When you receive an Approval Document, you must:

- · Read it carefully. It may include conditions that you must meet or time limits you must respect.
- · Keep a copy of the Approval Document on the work site at all times.
- · Meet all conditions of approval.
- · Expect a TC official inspect your site to make sure you are meeting all conditions of approval.

Table 2 - The Approval Process - Step by Step

- 6. If notified by Transport Canada, advertise your work project in the legal section, if possible. We will send you a sample ad, complete instructions and a blank Statutory Declaration of Advertising. When you have advertised your project:
 - Have the "Statutory Declaration of Advertising" witnessed by a Commissioner of Oaths and return it to Transport Canada with 1 copy of the advertisements.
 - · Allow one month for comments from the public before starting to build.

NOTE: The advertising process may have to be repeated if done too soon, if information is missing or if project plans change.

- 7. If asked, provide Transport Canada with any additional information needed for the environmental assessment.

A: New Bridge

It may be time to consider the longer term need for another bridge over the Grand River. In the past there was some discussion about a possible bridge at the foot of St Paul Avenue, crossing over to West Brant.

B: Missing BSAR link

One of the factors leading to congestion on both of Clarence Street and Brant Avenue, is the previous city decision to abandon the completion of the BSAR link from Erie Avenue (at the bridge over the river) to the Gretzky Parkway at Colborne Street East. Failure to complete that link also limits the re-development of the Mohawk-Greenwich brownfield site, as that link would have provided transportation access essential to that development.

I know that some thought has been given to adding 2 lanes to the current BSAR bridge (connecting Erie Avenue to Mt Pleasant Street), but keep in mind that that solution, while providing some relief for Brant Avenue, may exacerbate the traffic congestion on Clarence Street.

C. Railway re-location - impact on other city objectives

It is essential that the railway tracks along Clarence Street be removed. This line also crosses the Greenwich-Mohawk brownfield site, and will limit the re-development options for that site. In addition, where this RR line crosses current major roadways such as Colborne, Greenwich and Dalhousie, there are significant current risks for accidents involving cars, motorcycles and other kinds of vehicles. The do nothing option on this RR line, has significant impact on other city goals and objectives, as it currently cuts through the middle of our DT urban area and the newly expanded DT BIA boundaries. This is also a growing university district. Developing the DT Urban area with more intensification and the encouragement of the growth of post-secondary in the Downtown (DT) will be affected negatively if we do not succeed in eliminating this RR line along Clarence Street.

I can provide you with considerable background on this if you wish.

Brant Avenue "GRIDLOCK"

Anyone who tries to use Brant Avenue after 3:00pm during the week knows you better not be in a hurry!

The ultimate solution to this is a third bridge over the Grand River, perhaps at the end of St. Paul's Avenue. Former City Engineer Ron Middleton, designed such a bridge even back in the 1980's.

In the meantime, here are some suggestions to address the present situation. Perhaps first it would be helpful to determine the origin and destination of people using Brant Avenue. This could be done with a simple on-street survey or a questionnaire to the people living working in the Homedale area. Accompany the questionnaire with a postage paid return envelope.

Perhaps the above is not necessary because the problem is perfectly obvious.

Here are two suggestions to improve the situation.

- 1. Return Grand River Avenue to a "through street" at the east end of Lorne Bridge. This would allow traffic to go straight through to icomm Drive or turn right over Lorne Bridge to West Brantford or other destinations west of the Grand River. Obviously there would have to be control lights at that intersection.
- 2. Make use of the former L.E. & N. rail underpass at the east end of Lorne Bridge. This rail line is now abandoned and is for sale all or parts of it! This under-pass is wide enough for two lanes of traffic. This would allow vehicles wishing to either access icomm Drive from Grand River Avenue or vise versa. Vehicles then coming from Eagle Place and places south of the City could directly access Grand River Avenue and destinations in Homedale and beyond. This would avoid having to go through an intersection at the east end of Lorne Bridge.

As a long time resident west of the Grand River and someone who frequently uses the Lorne Bridge and the B.S.A.R. Bridge, I would encourage City staff and Councillors to examine these two suggestions.

The OMB Hearing may have concluded, but there is still some work we need to do. The City has planned some very important meetings later this month.

First of all, the public consultation for the City's Official Plan Review will take place on October 22nd and 23rd at the Brantford District Civic Centre beginning at 6:30 p.m. Visit www.brantford.ca/govt/projects/officalplanreview/ for more information.

Secondly, the City's second Transportation Master Plan Workshop is set for Thursday October 24th again at the Brantford District Civic Centre but beginning at 8:30 p.m. Visit http://www.brantford.ca/TransportationMasterPlan for more information.

Please be reminded that the City has planned for the following three major infrastructure changes:

- a) Oakpark arterial road and bridge over the Grand River into West Brant (cost to we taxpayers \$37 million),
- b) restructuring of Hardy Road Major Railway Crossing (cost to we taxpayers \$15 million), and
- c) restructuring of Hardy Road into four lanes (cost to we taxpayers \$5.8 million),

equaling a whopping total of \$57.8 million! (Source: 2009 City of Brantford Development Charges Study). And don't believe that the out of town home developers will end up paying for the \$57.8 million! We, the taxpayers, will be stuck with the bill!

Also, the proposed Hardy Road developments are not conducive to the goals of Brantford's Waterfront Master Plan. Moreover, these proposed developments are proposed for the Hardy Road Area – a groundwater sensitive area that has a high vulnerability score of 9/10, indicating that pollutants can very easily make their way to a well or intake (i.e. the Grand River and area wells – our drinking water!)

And then there's The Brantford Golf and Country Club. The Club feels that a four lane restructure of Hardy Road will cause safety problems as proposed area developments will significantly impact on the traffic volumes that currently exist. Two golf crossings exist along Hardy Road. The Club also feels that the widening of Hardy Road could potentially reduce the Club's 18 hole championship course to a 16 hole course with no members. Furthermore, the Club feels that the loss of land due to the road widening would eliminate the natural tree canopy along Hardy Road. The Club wonders if these possibilities are the legacy for the 134 year old 4th oldest Golf Club in North America. (Source: 2008 letter sent by the Club to the Planning Department at City Hall)

Friends, if we want change, we definitely need to attend these meetings/workshops and voice our opinions! I certainly hope you are able to attend.
