The Downtown Brantford Improvement Task Force is the next step in this collective journey, and serves as a call-to-action for leaders within the business, education, government and non-profit sectors for continued collaboration and creativity to ensure that the downtown is safe, vibrant and welcoming to for residents, students and visitors.



DEFINING OUR PRIORITIES

Downtown Brantford Public Consultation Campaign

The objective of the public consultation campaign was to ensure the community and key stakeholders could participate in a series of meaningful engagement opportunities to help inform the Priorities Plan.

Public feedback was collected through a series of public and stakeholder engagement opportunities conducted in October and November 2021 including:

- Online public engagement through Let's Talk Brantford;
- A month-long social media campaign on City's Facebook, Twitter and Instagram platforms;
- Two public virtual town halls on October 19, 2021;
- Stakeholder engagement session with Community Supports Working Group members;
- Stakeholder engagement session with Economic and Cultural Vitality Working Group members;
- Stakeholder engagement session with Safety and Security Working Group members; and,
- People with Lived Experience survey.

The focused efforts of the Task Force Working Groups, combined with public input, resulted in the identification of 3 Focus Areas and 18 Key Priorities, representing a mix of short and long terms actions, with many currently underway.

KEY PRIORITIES

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Safety and Security

- Increase the presence of special constables downtown;
- Increase the presence of security officers downtown;
- Train police officers to conduct audits and make recommendations based on Crime Prevention Through Environmental Design (CPTED) principles;
- Explore the feasibility of additional safety initiatives in the downtown (i.e. CCTV Cameras, Safe Walk, lighting improvements, CPTED incentive program);

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Colborne St

Brant's Crossing

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- Advocate to upper levels of government for bail reform, increased judicial resources and other needed supports; and,
- Explore the feasibility of additional traffic safety measures downtown.

Inclusion and Support

Greyhound-Brantford

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- Ongoing, transparent and authentic engagement with Indigenous stakeholders to inform and co-create appropriate responses to local issues;
- Increase awareness, availability and coordination of social supports and housing services available in the downtown including safe, public and accessible washroom facilities;
- Explore projects to reduce stigma and encourage inclusivity in the downtown;
- Leverage community partnerships to make the downtown a supportive and welcoming environment for post-secondary students; and,
- Explore the feasibility of a community research hub downtown and enhanced data sharing among social service providers.

Growth and Vibrancy

- Continue to support residential and business development downtown and the growth of post-secondary educational institutions;
- Develop a unified approach to marketing, promotion and grant writing among downtown stakeholders and explore the options of developing further grant and incentive programs;
- Leverage the community's historical and cultural heritage when planning events and programs in the downtown;
- Explore the feasibility of a cultural hub downtown;
- Improve the cleanliness and image of downtown;
- Promote downtown as a unique event and program venue and continue to develop linkages to the waterfront and Mohawk-Greenwich District; and,
- Explore parking and transit solutions that support the vibrancy and economic growth of the downtown.

MOVING FORWARD

Early Successes

Community planning can be a lengthy process, often taking years to produce noticeable results. Although many of these priorities are long-term, the Downtown Brantford Improvement Task Force has been a catalyst for immediate actions and investment, including:

- Increase of Special Constables Downtown;
- Development of a permanent Mobile Security Team;
- Streamlining the development approvals process (technology, response time, organizational alignment);
- Memorandum of Understanding between the City of Brantford and WLU for collaborative research;
- Advocacy regarding bail reform and additional judicial resources; and,
- Increased coordination of social supports and encampment response.

In addition, significant progress is being made on projects to support the long-term growth, appearance and economic potential of the downtown and surrounding districts. These projects include streetscaping, active transportation options, improved trails, infrastructure, traffic calming measures, graffiti removal, lighting enhancements and more.

Additional success drivers include the ongoing expansion of post-secondary education, a review of emergency shelter and homelessness outreach services, the return of events and festivals to the downtown post-COVID, and the re-visioning of One Market Square as an education and cultural hub.

Private sector development will also be an important catalyst for investment and improved economic outcomes, with over 1700 residential units currently in the approval planning process. These projects will also contribute significant commercial space and business opportunities within the City Centre.

These revitalization efforts will complement the ongoing development on the waterfront and Mohawk-Greenwich Districts, positioning the downtown as a corridor of business, events, culture and learning, unique in the Province, and filled with potential.

Celebrate and Collaborate

The development of the Downtown Brantford Priority Plan serves as a challenge to all downtown stakeholders to use its available resources, capital investment, program development and partnerships in support of this common vision.

Maintaining the momentum of this Priority Plan is critical to long-term success. Beginning in Spring 2023, the City will host an annual *Let's Go Downtown* celebration event, bringing together Task Force Members and the community to provide updates regarding the Downtown Brantford Priority Plan, discuss emerging challenges and develop solutions. During the interim, stakeholders will continue to research and establish appropriate next steps for ideas brought forward through the public consultation and working group process.

Following these annual forums, City staff will provide a report to Brantford City Council to ensure status updates regarding the Priority Plan are publicly available.
